RECOMMENDED ACTION:

It is recommended that the City Council adopt a Resolution Opposing South Coast Air Quality Management District Proposed Rules 1111 (Reduction of NOx Emissions from Natural Gas-Fired Furnaces) and 1121 (Reduction of NOx Emissions from Small Natural Gas-Fired Water Heaters) due to potential financial impacts on homeowners, renters, and businesses.

GOAL STATEMENT

The proposed action supports the City's commitment to balancing environmental goals with economic feasibility by ensuring that regulatory changes do not place excessive financial burdens on residents and businesses.

BACKGROUND

The South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) has proposed amendments to Rule 1111 and Rule 1121, which aim to transition natural gas-fired furnaces and water heaters to zero-emission alternatives. If implemented, these changes would require the replacement of existing appliances with zero-emission units upon the end of their service life.

ISSUES AND ANALYSIS

SCAQMD's proposal is part of a broader strategy to meet federal air quality standards. However, staff has identified potential cost increases for homeowners, renters, and businesses due to the expense of transitioning to zero-emission appliances. The San Bernardino Council of Governments (SBCOG) has reviewed this matter and recommended opposing these rule changes due to their economic impact.

- Economic Impact: Compliance with the proposed rules would require homeowners and businesses to replace natural gas-fired appliances with zero-emission alternatives, which could be significantly more expensive.
- Regulatory Burden: The transition to zero-emission appliances would necessitate infrastructure upgrades and increased costs for property owners.
- Local Opposition: The SBCOG Board has already taken a position against the proposed rules, and staff recommends that the City of Upland align with SBCOG in opposing these regulations.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION

The proposed action is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) under Section 15378 of the CEQA Guidelines, as it involves policy adoption rather than a physical project.

FISCAL IMPACTS

There is no fiscal impact associated with this action.

ALTERNATIVES

Provide alternative direction – The City Council may request further analysis or propose a modified response to SCAQMD's proposed rules.
