RE: Letter Opposing SCAQMD Proposed Rules 1111 and 1121

The City of Upland opposes Proposed Rules 1111 and 1121, two rules South Coast Air Quality Management District are considering transitioning natural gas-fired furnaces and water heaters to zero-emission alternatives.
